

In accordance with the order of the Board of Aldermen authorizing the Mayor to apply for and accept all grants on behalf of the City of New Haven, passed October 17, 1994, I am respectfully writing to advise you of an application by the City of New Haven's Department of Police Service to the Connecticut Department of Transportation for a grant to reimburse the Department for police overtime for a targeted high visibility enforcement program for distracted driving, including public education through media venues on the risks and consequences of operating a vehicle while distracted, especially by hand-held phone use. The aim of the program is to reduce the number of motor vehicle crashes, injuries, and fatalities during the periods October 15 through 30, 2021 and April 1 through 30, 2022 at the most troublesome locations in the City. Dear President Walker-Myers,

I am writing to submit a resolution urging New Haven's state delegation to support the Transportation and Climate Initiative (TCI), which will improve public health, create jobs, and invest much-needed resources in our community.

From a public health perspective, TCI makes sense for New Haven and for Connecticut as a whole. Connecticut's asthma rate is worse than the national average—11 percent of Connecticut's children and 10.5 percent of adults have asthma. Making matters worse, New Haven ranks as the 5<sup>th</sup> most challenging city to live in for people with asthma in the United States.

The transportation sector is the largest contributor of greenhouse gas emissions (38%) and air pollution (67%) in Connecticut. That's why we need to reduce the dangerous transportation emissions that poison our air and make life harder for our residents—especially kids, the elderly, and anyone with underlying health conditions. TCI will help reduce emissions and keep our air clean for generations to come.

TCI is not just about air quality, though. It is also a jobs and investment program that will bring new resources to our city. The Connecticut General Assembly's Environment Committee has committed to sending 50% of the revenue generated with TCI to low-income communities like New Haven. Additionally, TCI will create thousands of new, good-paying jobs by increasing investment in green energy and infrastructure projects across our city and state.

While it is important that state leaders support TCI, we also need to urge them to fight for a TCI package that guarantees that working and middle-class people don't bear the financial burden of this policy. Possible ideas could include instituting a progressive rate structure to lower electricity costs for low-income families, raising the value of Connecticut's Earned Income Tax Credit, or implementing other tax changes that make sure TCI does not make Connecticut even less affordable for the poor and the middle class.

I hope the Board of Alders will pass this resolution urging our state delegation to negotiate a TCI package that both enters Connecticut into the TCI compact and creates progressive financial offsets for low- and middle-income Connecticut families.

### RESOLUTION URGING GOVERNOR LAMONT AND THE CONNECTICUT GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO SUPPORT A TRANSPORTATION AND CLIMATE INITIATIVE PACKAGE THAT INCLUDES PROGRESSIVE FINANCIAL OFFSETS FOR LOW- AND MIDDLE-INCOME FAMILIES

**WHEREAS,** as members of the Board of Alders of the city of New Haven, it is our duty to protect the health, safety, and financial security of our constituents;

**WHEREAS,** for decades, cars and trucks have created pollutants such as sulfur dioxide, carbon monoxide, nitrogen oxide, particulate matter, and other types of hydrocarbons that have resulted in poor air quality in our city;

**WHEREAS**, these pollutants caused by transportation are known to worsen respiratory problems such as asthma and chronic lung disease; increase the risk that conditions such as cancer and heart disease will lead to premature death; and significantly increase human and financial health care costs;

**WHEREAS,** according to the Asthma and Allergy Foundation of America, the city of New Haven ranks as the 5th most challenging city to live in for people with asthma in the United States;

**WHEREAS**, 301 out of every 10,000 New Haven residents visit the emergency room due to asthma every year;

**WHEREAS,** children, people of color, the elderly, people with pre-existing conditions, and people living in highly polluted areas are especially vulnerable to the health risks of transportation pollution;

**WHEREAS,** New Haven needs investments that expand access to reliable and convenient public bus and train service; provide funding for traffic calming; and expand opportunities for safe, active, and affordable transportation such as biking and walking;

**WHEREAS**, we must act to improve our city's public health while investing in clean infrastructure that will benefit all of our constituents and neighbors;

**WHEREAS,** in December of 2020 Governor Lamont signed a Memorandum of Understanding with Massachusetts, Rhode Island and the District of Columbia to commit the State of Connecticut to establish the Transportation and Climate Initiative Program ("TCI"), a program that would cap greenhouse gas pollution from motor vehicles through a market-based allowance program, the proceeds of which would be used to invest in clean transportation projects and related programs;

**WHEREAS,** TCI would make critical investments to create an affordable clean transportation system by funding improved bus service, bus electrification, traffic calming, and bike and pedestrian safety upgrades, leading to safer streets, more affordable commutes, and better air quality for our community;

**WHEREAS,** TCI would raise an estimated \$1 billion over ten years for the State's Special Transportation Fund to be spent on Connecticut's state and municipal transportation and infrastructure systems, creating local jobs in construction, public transportation, telecommunications, and manufacturing for our residents still recovering from the pandemic recession;

**WHEREAS,** TCI, like the Board of Alders legislative agenda, is built around environmental justice and would send 50% of all investment dollars (amounting to approximately \$500 million over ten years) to communities like New Haven that are hit hard by air pollution and lack a modern, accessible, and affordable transportation system;

**WHEREAS,** an Equity and Environmental Justice Advisory Board—comprised of residents of impacted communities like New Haven—would provide oversight to guide these prioritized investments;

**WHEREAS,** TCI-funded projects will help lower average annual car repair costs, lower road maintenance expenditures, and allow more Connecticut and New Haven residents to take the bus, walk, or bike to get around;

**WHEREAS,** Connecticut's taxation system is extremely regressive, with working- and middle-class residents, especially those who live in urban areas, paying a higher percentage of their income in taxes than wealthy state residents;

**WHEREAS,** given our state's regressive taxation system, state leaders should ensure that all efforts to lower transportation emissions do not fall on the backs of low- and middle-income Connecticut residents;

**AND WHEREAS,** TCI's equity provisions would be improved through the creation of new programs that support low-income families and keep energy affordable, such as a progressive rate structure that lowers electricity costs for low-income families, an expansion of Connecticut's Earned Income Tax Credit, or other tax changes that ensure TCI does not make Connecticut even less affordable for the poor and the middle class;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that in order to strengthen our economy and improve our city's public health, the Board of Alders of the city of New Haven urges Governor Lamont and the Connecticut General Assembly to support a legislative package that both enters Connecticut into the TCI compact and creates progressive financial offsets for low- and middle-income Connecticut families.

On March 11, 2021, President Biden signed into law the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (the "Act") which includes approximately \$1.9 trillion in investments designed to address the public health emergency and the direct and adverse impacts to the economy, to people and to community wellbeing; and

The American Rescue Plan Act can support communities working to reduce and respond to increased violence due to the pandemic by investing in technology and equipment to allow law enforcement to respond to the rise more efficiently and effectively in gun violence resulting from the pandemic.

The City is proposing to use The American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) for various Quality of Life Support, which will fund additional Police overtime, funding for Police Lateral hire bonuses and to upgrade City Public Safety Infrastructure.

## Lateral Hire Bonuses

As of 8/31, the NHPD has 319 filled positions from the 406 budgeted. 49 of those vacancies are in the rank of Police Officer - the backbone of the City's patrol. New the City has been engaged with the recruitment of and hiring of lateral officers since 2019.

Each lateral hire that would be awarded a sign-on bonus, which would save the City approximately \$22,000 each as opposed to the cost of a cadet going through the academy which cost the City an average of \$32,000.

#### Dear Mr. Smart:

In accordance with section 64 (d)(1) of the New Haven Zoning Ordinance, the Preservation Trust hereby submits a proposed text amendment to the Site Plan Review section of the Zoning Ordinance. The Trust has continuing concerns that applicants to the City Plan Commission for site plan approval are not required to identify or propose plans for designated State and National historic properties in their application materials.

Notable buildings that are contributing structures to National Register Historic Districts have been affected, and in some cases lost, during the site plan review process due in part to lack of attention to their historic value. This omission is inconsistent with other sections of the Zoning Ordinance, the Code of General Ordinances, and the Technical Ordinances.

Provisions in which historic properties must be identified and addressed include the following:

- The Zoning Ordinance section on Special Permits (Sec. 64 (e)(2)(f)) states that
  "...Features of historic significance shall not be significantly adversely affected by the granting of any special permit."
- The Code section on 90-day Delay of Demolition (Sec. 9-50 (b) (2)) states that
  "...A building, structure or part thereof which is proposed to be demolished is subject to delay of demolition if it is listed in any of the following:
  (i) Historic resources inventory;

*(ii) List of individual Properties on the National Register of Historic Places; or (iii) A contributing Property located within a National Register Historic District."* 

The Zoning Ordinance description of the B-1 District, Section 41, states as follows: "Business D-1 Districts—Central Business/Residential. These districts include appropriate downtown areas which have concentrations of historic structures suitable for both residential and commercial use.... The use of land is intensive, but respects the historic character of existing historic structures. It is the purpose of these regulations to encourage preservation of existing historic structures, conversion of existing structures to residential use, high intensity of use, and to exclude activities that have a negative effect upon the proper functioning of National Register Historic Districts or of the larger downtown." Technical Ordinances Title IV, Flood Damage Prevention, Sec. 7.4.1, allows the City Plan Commission to issue flood damage prevention (FDP) variances as follows: "FDP variances may be issued for the reconstruction, rehabilitation or restoration of structures listed on the National Register of Historic Places or the State Inventory of Historic Places without regard to the procedures set forth in the remainder of this section, except for section 7.5.3.1—7.5.3.4 and provided the proposed reconstruction, rehabilitation or restoration will not result in the structure losing its historical character."

In short, numerous provisions provide for identification and protection of the City's rich historic resources. It is troubling that site plan reviews, one of the most frequently used planning tools, do not include identification and review of historic resources.

We also note that State law encourages local planning and zoning entities to give special attention to historic resources. The CT General Statutes at Sec. 8-2 states: *"Zoning regulations may be made with reasonable consideration for the protection of historic factors."* 

The Preservation Trust proposes that Article VIII of the Zoning Ordinance of the City of New Haven be amended to add the following language to Section 64, City Plan Commission. (new language underlined)

Subsection (f) (5) Site plan contents. Site plans shall include the following:

ee. Identification of, and proposed plans for, any structures within or abutting the site which are (i) within a Local Historic District, (ii) individually listed on the State or National Register of Historic Places, or (iii) a contributing structure in a State or National Historic District.

Interest shall accrue at the rate of six percent per annum (one-half percent per month) on the Tax Principal specified in paragraph 1 from the due date of each installment thereof. Any interest which may have accrued in excess of such rate prior to the execution and recording of the Agreement shall be abated (eliminated). The municipal tax lien and the lien created by the Agreement shall be released by the Tax Collector when the Taxes secured thereby have been paid.

5. The Agreement, properly executed by the Taxpayer, shall be returned by the Taxpayer to the Office of Legislative Services for final review by Corporation Counsel, execution by the Mayor, and recording in the New Haven Land Records.

In accordance with the Order of the Board of Aldermen authorizing the mayor to apply for and accept all grants on behalf of the City of New Haven, passed October 17, 1994, I am respectfully writing to advise you of an application by the City of New Haven's Department of Police Service to the State of Connecticut, Office of Policy and Management (OPM). The Department is applying for reimbursement for the purchase of dashboard cameras through OPM's Body-Worn Camera and Dashboard Camera Grant Program. As the City of New Haven is listed as a Distressed Municipality, it is eligible for a 50% reimbursement of the first-year costs of equipment, software, storage, licenses, installation, and warranties.

Connecticut Public Act 20-1, An Act Concerning Police Accountability, established on October 1, 2020, mandates the purchase and deployment of dashboard cameras in all police departments by July 1, 2022. The Department established its body-worn camera program in 2017 with the vendor Taser/Axon. The Department plans to contract with Taser/Axon for the dashboard cameras. The estimated cost of the dashboard cameras is up to \$1,300,000.00, for a reimbursement of up to \$650,000.00.

The deadline to apply for reimbursement is December 31, 2021.

This note is to advise the Honorable Board of Alders that the Department of Police Service seeks to execute a 5-year contract with Taser/Axon for body-worn cameras (BWC) and tasers and seeks to purchase and install dashboard cameras and make upgrades to Interview Room equipment. The 5-year contract period is from 2021 through 2026, and will cover hardware, software, and network/installation costs for BWCs, tasers, dashboard cameras, and interview room equipment.

The 5-year cost is \$5,740,000.00. The Year One cost of \$3,004,800 to be paid from the police capital fund budget covers hardware, installation/set-up costs, and one year's worth of Taser cartridges, training vouchers, and software. The balance of \$2,735,200 will be paid in Years Two through Five from the police general fund and IT general fund budgets: the police budget will pay for Taser cartridges and training vouchers and the IT budget will pay for annual software and maintenance expenses.

The hardware included in this contract is as follows:

- **147 Axon Fleet 3 Dashboard Cameras** with a refresh at the end of 5 years. A "refresh" is when we obtain replacement equipment of either the same model or the most current model, ensuring that we are always using current technology within useful life. This camera provides seamless integration with the Department's BWC program and Evidence.com.
- **5 Axon Interview Room Upgrades** (4 Investigative Services Unit and 1 Internal Affairs), which will live-stream and ingest interviews into Evidence.com for digital evidence management. Video quality will be improved for use in prosecutions.
- 800 AB3 BWCs with 2 refreshes over the 5-year contract period, enabling us to continue our two-camera system to best ensure a charged camera at all times.
- 25 Flex 2 BWCs for SWAT to better mount to their gear, including refreshes.
- **350 T7 Tasers** and corresponding cartridges to cover training and deployment replenishments for the 5-year contract period. This dual cartridge system includes signal activation of BWCs.
- **Taser training** vouchers to cover training certification requirements for the 5-year contract period.

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The software/IT included in this contract is Evidence.com. The following products will be included in the negotiated price if the contract is approved by September 30, 2021:

- Axon Response for Devices: This technology brings real-time situational awareness features like live maps and streaming to our connected devices. It helps officers and command staff maintain visibility of developing situations, obtain and share information as it emerges, and send help as needed.
- Axon Performance: This technology automates BWC reviews and provides actionable, up to date compliance information, such as camera use during calls for services, with an intuitive metrics dashboard and sharable reporting capabilities. The service extracts patterns of behavior from our Evidence.com data to improve agency review processes, guide policy updates, and identify opportunities for officer training and development.
- Axon Redaction Assistant: This technology uses automation to identify and mask the most common objects and personally identifiable information found in video evidence such as screens, faces, and license plates from BWC, in-car, and interview room video. With autoredacted video, users can focus on more complex work.
- Axon Citizen for Communities: This technology will allow us to engage the community in efforts to investigate crimes and preserve public safety. The Department will be able to launch public portals from Evidence.com to collect digital evidence submissions from the public, which are screened for viruses and categorized automatically, enabling us to review potential evidence files safely and quickly.

Connecticut Public Act 20-1, An Act Concerning Police Accountability, established on October 1, 2020, mandates the purchase and deployment of BWCs and dashboard cameras in all police departments by July 1, 2022. The Department established its BWC program in 2017 with the vendor Taser/Axon. It is noteworthy that the State of Connecticut Office of Policy and Management offers a 50% reimbursement to distressed municipalities—of which New Haven is one--for the first-year costs for implementing the dashboard camera program, estimated at up to \$650,000.00. In order to be eligible for the reimbursement, the cameras must be purchased by December 31, 2021.
